
In 1892 the Episcopal Diocese of Florida was split into two sections: he Diocese of Florida to the north and the Missionary District of Southern Florida. The first mention of All Saints Episcopal mission with 10 communicants was in that year. As there was no church building, services were held in parishioners' homes.

By 1905, with 24 communicants, plans were made for erecting a church building. A choice block of property near the center of the town of Tarpon Springs was offered by a business man from Philadelphia. Without anticipating further growth, a small plot of only 85 feet x 185 feet was selected at the corner of Tarpon and Grosse Avenues.

The little church, begun in 1906, was constructed of locally cut native Florida pine, to which aging imparted an almost indestructible hardness. The church was built in the Florida Gothic style with a seating capacity of 48. Consecration of the church building by Bishop Gray was held on February 23, 1907. The first Parish meeting was held in the church in 1908. Mrs. John Cheyney served as organist at the dedication and also founded the women's organization now known as Episcopal Church Women.

The ECW provided all of the original pews and altar linens, while donations from other parishioners and friends paid for the building and interior fittings. The first memorial is the high altar stained glass window depicting Christ receiving and blessing children, which was installed when the church was built in 1906. Over the years many other memorial stained glass windows were added.

Over the years the congregation fluctuated due to both the Depression and World Wars. By 1958 the congregation had grown to 82 communicants and in the 1960's a Sunday School was formed. As the congregation continued to grow it became necessary to expand the Church in 1966. The seating capacity now became 130. The church had a bell tower, but a proper bell was lacking. A bell was chosen but as it weighed nearly 300 pounds it meant the belfry would have to be reinforced. Fifty-eight years after the erection of All Saints Church, the bell pealed in the belfry for the first time.

In November of 1970, All Saints was admitted to Parish status and *Rev. Willis Doyle* became the first Rector. As All Saints continued to expand it soon reached the limits of its facilities and a successful stewardship program soon led to the purchase of a heavily wooded four acre building site overlooking Lake Tarpon on Keystone Road. The plans called for the relocation of the beloved church building to the new site, the erection of a new parish hall, and sufficient parking areas.

At midnight on June 20, 1979 a procession of church members moved onto Tarpon Ave to proceed to the site on Keystone Road. The church and bell tower were moved separately with the church placed on a large flatbed truck. Coordinated efforts were made by the utility companies to raise and lower telephone and power lines along the route, along with the dexterity of the movers who took such special care of the beloved church through the long night. The police department, aware of the historic value of the little building, escorted the move.

Shortly after 7am the church and its procession of believers, some on foot, some in cars, some on bicycles, arrived at the large bluff-like piece of property at the edge of Lake Tarpon. A decision had been made to leave the priceless stained glass windows in place, as well as the antique chandeliers that had been installed in 1966. All survived without incident. The fine craftsmanship showed its fortitude. After prayers of thanksgiving, all present enjoyed a champagne reception as a toast to the success of the journey.

By 1982 the number of parishioners had increased and the need for more pews in the church was evident. The decision was made to expand the west (Gospel) side of the church to alleviate the overcrowding. This was completed in 1984. In 1989 expansion of the east side was completed and a nine rank Reuter pipe organ was installed. These additions brought All Saints Church to its present size.

All Saints Episcopal Church exists today because of the faith and devotion of its ten original founders, who gathered for worship and fellowship, as well as those who followed with the same faith and devotion. We continue in our Mission of the Church to restore all people to unity with God and each other in Christ.
